The menu here has a Spanish influence (the owners met in Barcelona), with dishes such as patatas bravas and crema catalana. The look is both chic and rustic: brick walls, leather studded sofas, and two patios for alfresco dining.

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With a nod to the neighborhood's tradition of carpentry, this furniture store sells chairs, tables, bowls, and wall hooks made of Chilean *lenga* wood, crafted with clean, modern lines and smooth finishes.


